Began March 11, 1947 —

March 11 Tuesday.

wake up early after a night of broken sleep to find fog all over Bosphorus. Plane delayed. Sulaiman's car took us to Jeyikiev at 8:45 waited three hours here waiting. Wm. Stenches to see us off. A truck load of R.C. boys. who gave us a giant box of biscuits. Wonderful take off at 11:45 A.M. lunch on board. About 32 passengers. Head wind after Naples. Bumpy. ~~Left~~ ^{and} came at 6:30 Saw Paris through ship. Reached London 11:15 on time (9:15 London time) Cold as Siberia. lively visit of $\frac{3}{2}$ hr with Greta, Wilfred, Jennifer, Rachel, Evelyn & Kenneth. All too short. Off at 10:15 to Shannon - bumpy. 1 A.M. dinner at Shannon. Off in rain, blowy night at 2:30 A.M. Rough night over Atlantic
March 12 Wednesday

clocks all asleep. lovely weather
 above clouds - saw cumulus - part
 or cotton wool grapefruit juice
 or plane. Over Newfoundland -
 desolate country. Reached fares
 by 10:30 (lander time 8:20!) First
 North American left. Cold as
 ice outside. Brilliant sunshine.
 Left fares at 9:30. Came down
 east coast of N.S. - reached La
 Guardia Field (Creevy Mumpsey) at
 12:30. busy & Eleanor, Lee & Peggy,
 & Edgar Fisher to meet us. A note
 from Mac. Pictures taken. lunch
 all of us ⁽¹⁾ at La Guardia Air
 port. marvellous to be here! Drove
 home to South Orange in busy car.
 Talkative evening when I nearly
 fell asleep. Bed in the perfect
 guest Room. Just the same. It
 means something.

March 13 Thursday.

Left at 8:15. Dropped with busy in East
 Orange. Paper - arrived. Keweenaw!
 Sandwich lunch at home. Rest P.M.
 To Westfield with busy for radios.
 To see Dr. Sher Hughes in evening. 8 -
 Heard Barbara Ward (very good) at
 Town Hall meeting of the air, long talks
 till 10:45.

March 14 Friday.

Bad night. Poor sleep. Betty Fisher

 leaves by air this evening for Istanbul.

March 16 Sunday

Mrs. Hartwell came in before supper for dinner. listened to Margaret Truman's musical debut - then Dead album at 8:30 (David's favorite comedian.)

\$3350.39. Put in Bank, took Bob

Kerner shops. Bade on 4:45. Fied
depressed by poor digestion. Found 5
letters - one about an apt. from Harac.

March 22 Saturday.

So low about my condition that I stayed in bed - only rice & tea all day. Slept & slept. Dr. Dunge came to see me at 6:45. gave me an injection & advice. Called my trouble fatigue & strain! American ski season. Got up for dinner in. then Gerald Foster for dinner. He painted David's picture. they are charming. left at 11:40.

March 24 Monday

March 25 Tuesday.

May 6, Tuesday (Home 1918)

S. off at 8:50 At 10 went to

can-Hellenic Society. Take care!
I saw the place. Tiny but com-
plete. \$72.50 a month.

Electricity & telephones extra
Shopped afterwards. Lunch in.
S. in at 4:15 tea. says I take the
apt. after dinner we saw Miss
J. together & decided definitely
on place even tho' second bed

is a couch. Then called Foshier but she
was out. Then called on Ada Beckley at
527 W. 121. Stuff, apt. asked her for
tea on Sat. She soon goes to Kansas
she says, for visit.

May 7 Wednesday (Gladys 1891)

Up at 6:30 To Dr. Martin's at 8-8-
with me. Lengthy procedure in
office. had mole removed. Not
too bad. Home at once. S. to town.
Lunch in. Rested. In even. called
on Robinson & Hull at 878 W. End. Home
with as always - Goleman & in-
patient. Discussed Louise's book -
criticized my criticisms. I think
I like Helen better than Louise.
The latter always repeats 1) Cecil
Edwards 2) Stamp Harry Dwight.
3) Asks after Nellie Summers.
Home in cold wind - by bus
at 9:45.

May 8 Thursday (Kennebec 1899)

Busy, domestic till 11 - 10:15.

Thought I was going to town but discovered such a cold wind that I only stopped here by for food & stayed here. Sailed. Read Josephson on Stendhal. Very good. wrote some letters. My cheek not too sore, but I feel the wind.

S. in by tea time - Tea & dinner in a quiet evening, which I enjoyed.

May 9 Friday

Soff as usual earlyish. I was very domestic till 10:30. At 11.

to Dr. Martin for dressing of wound. The nurse, Miss Jumps, did it in 2 minutes. Young doctor (Dr. Ishaw?) urges me to have gaiter cut.

makes ribald remarks! Perhaps July! From Dr. M. to Quibels - hot 1) 2 cups 2) 5 plastic naps 3) at Macy's 6 hand towels. Then to Embroidery shop - - on to Paul's on East 45th where I met S. Surprisingly good lunch. Home on bus - by 3:15. Mr. Chase called up, asked to come & see me. Did so - arrived with unpleasant letters from O game, who objects to our being here. "Man! Man!" I don't think we'll go but S thinks we'll have to!

At 2 came to Butler Hall.


Paid him 20 dollars + said

Very good indeed.


