## ADANA- TARSUS--MERSIN

Intro:

Do not feel competent to talk about Anatolia, especially this important corner of it. But will tell my own experience.

Three cities I)Adana the most important now--the one on the great highroad to the east since Roman times and before.

2) Tarsus, the oldest and most interesting because it was at one time a great and prosperous port 3) Mersin, the new port a comparatively modern development.

## I.-Adana-----a-little-ef-its-history

Geography--the Cilician plain, the Tamrus mountains. The Cilician gates. Cotton fertility. Two important rivers Cyndus and Seyhan.

Reana. flat country-gateway to the East. remains-fine stone bridge part of which dates from Justinian. Ruined castle built by Haroun-al-Rachid. 782
Military road to Persia and the East.
Mixture of rages for many years.

Barsus. first mentioned in 850 B.C. probably an old Ionian colony. Importance due to

- I. excellent and safe harbor
- 3. possession of fertile territory.
- 3. Command of first wagon road made across the Taurus mountains which was cut thru the Cilician gates a narrow gorge IOO yards in length

Many armies passed thru gates and into Tarsu Cyrus the younger Alexander the Great Septimus Serverus First Crusade

After IO4 B.C. one of the greatest of Raman cities.

Meeting of Anthony and Cleopatra. Quote:

Ene: When she first met Mark Anthony, she pursed up his heart upon the river of Cyndus Agr. There she appeared indeed, or my reporte devised well for her.

Eno: I will tell you.

The barge she sat in, like a burnished throne,

Burn'd on the water: the poop was beaten gold:

Purple the sails, and so perfumed that The winds were love-sick with them; the oars were silver,

Which to the tune of flutes kept stroke and made

The water which they beat to follow faster, As amorous of their strokes. For her own person,

It beggar'd all description: she did lie
In her pavilion, cloth of gold tissue,
O'er-picturing that Venus where we see
The fancy out-work nature: on each side her

Tarsus in ancient times depended on commerce peace good government.

Arabs conquered it in A.D. 660 In 787 capital of Arab power.

"All the raids which were made in Asia Minor regularly, year by year, through the Cilician Gates and past the forters of Loulon issued thru the north gate of Tarsus which was called the gate of the Holy Wars. The western gate if still standing and is misnamed "St. Paul's Gate"

Ottomans came here about beginning of I6th cehtury.
Ruins Tomb Of Sardanopoulos.

Mersin Modern city after Tarsus had vanished as a port. shallow water. founded 1832 many Christians lived here before the war. traders and shippers. bad summer climate. Poor city, now. conquest of malaria.
